I started working in a physician's office and the nurse there would tell me, in front of the patients, that I was a two-year RN and so did not know as much as I should. That sure didn't help my self esteem. Even a friend I knew socially who was a four-year RN was quick to tell everyone that two year RN's were very inadequately trained. We were often

told that we should go to a nursing home to get our training. Well, my husband was going to college so I was forced to get a job in a nursing home; I was not there too long when I found I really enjoyed the elderly. I found I could be so much more creative in that setting. My first big job was to be a DNS/ and Administrator for a 65 bed nursing home. I learned a lot that year and decided to stay in geriatrics. Received my administrator's license in 1972 MY CAREER: Worked as a DNS/Administrator of a 65 bed nursing home in Eugene. Opened two new nursing homes in the area - organizing the nursing department as the DNS. Worked as a rehab nurse for insurance companies. Taught CNS"s and Home Health Aides for LCC.
