


Clifford Guse

The people of PNG are either from the highlands...






–who are mainly farmers.

Ukarumpa which is also called "little America" in PNG.




Consists of departments of... construction, aviation, auto shop, print shop, post office, schools, etc...

I also helped with a turbine tear down for the King Air.




One of it's engines was struck by lightning...
