Fast Lane to Success Expands to 12 Sections

More than five years ago, Fast Lane to Success began as a two-course learning community. Since then, Fast Lane has grown to twelve sections and now links College Success with a host of classes tailored to suit firstyear students' needs. In Fall 2009, Lane offered Beyond the Field, a "fast lane" for student athletes; Visualizing Success, a "fast lane" for aspiring artists; Math Fast Lane with Math

60; and Fast Lanes with Speech and Writing classes, including two online sections.

What makes Fast Lanes to Success so successful? Fast Lane students spend the term learning how to create success in their lives by setting short-term and longterm goals, learning how to take purposeful actions toward their college and life goals, and overcoming selfdefeating patterns in school and life, among other topics. Students are in cohorts and so develop relationships with peers while they work toward their degree with key discipline-area courses. Fast Lane faculty now number twenty-two. New "Pen and Page" Developmental Learning Community: Helping Students Start Out Right

Fast Lane to Success is not the only First Year Experience (FYE) that Lane students can benefit from. In "Pen and Page," a new learning community for Reading and Writing 80 students, instructors Elaine Pray and Cristina Simoni take advantage of the natural connection between reading and writing skills. Students who are not quite ready for college-level classes take both RD80 and WR 80 classes in the same term, resulting in a full schedule of developmental course work with coordinated curriculum, a combination sure to increase student success.

By now many faculty and staff have heard that Lane received a five-year, \$2 million Title III grant from the Department of Education. This grant is intended to strengthen institutions, and Lane is using the money to support college-wide efforts to improve student retention and success.
