INITIATIVE TITLE: Business Tutor Coordinator position.

DESCRIPTION: Business students currently account for the greatest use of the Tutor Center and have the largest compliment of tutors scheduled. A Business Tutor Coordinator is needed to coordinate with the Business Technologies faculty, recruit new tutors, train and provide orientation, schedule weekly hours, cover absences, and monitor and evaluate tutor performance. A tutor currently tries to accomplish this task in addition to tutoring and it has not been adequate coordination and preparation of tutors for business students. This initiative is feasible and the position would be on the Main Campus. Math, Music, and Science currently have Tutor Coordinators. This position would also play a role in the campus wide coordination of tutoring and help coordinate tutors for other business programs in computer labs. In introductory classes student success is closely correlated with the availability of assistance. The availability of higher quality tutoring help will create greater student success in these classes.

RESOURCES NEEDED: Instructional Specialist position, .5 FTE Coordinator & .5 FTE Tutor. Maximum cost – Grade 8/ Step 8 annual salary is \$33,800 + \$16,866 OPE = \$50,666.
