Back on Course is a 1-credit, “early alert” course, that responds to students struggling academically and landing in a state of financial aid disqualification. The course has proven to be extremely successful in retaining students and offering them direction to persist and succeed in college. Students experiencing financial aid disqualification for academic reasons, can opt to take this course and receive their aid as part of the process. In 2007-2008 there were 15 courses held. This year there will be at least 15 courses held again, and in FY10 there is an anticipation of additional courses being added. Expected impact is that more students each term would have financial aid reinstated and enroll in BOC and other classes. There would be FTE recovered by the college as a consequence, as well as an intervention to help students regain good academic standing.
