New Religion Course - Women in Religion

Summary:

Request for 100 hours Curriculum Development funding for the development of a course in Women in Religion.

Description

Veena Howard would like to develop a course in the way women are viewed by religion and the role of women in religious history and modern religious movements. This course serves the college's mission to gender diversity and would expand the scope of our Religion offerings into an underrepresented area. It would heighten awareness of the role of women in religion and call attention to historical and current issues of women's rights and social justice where religion fosters gender discrimination or promulgate negative stereotypes about women.

- Students will learn to think critically about how their own views on gender may have been shaped by their religious upbringing or the predominantly Judeo-Christian culture of the United States
- Students will demonstrate the ability to write reflectively and persuasively about women in religion.

Women in Religion

This course will provide a place for faculty to direct recurring questions about the role of women in religion which cannot be covered exhaustively in an introductory course. This course will develop material which other instructors might adapt to enhance more general courses in religion

30 students per year will be served by this course.

- Students will acquire knowledge of the historic and current role women play in religious life and institutions.
- Students will gain an appreciation for the use of feminine metaphors and imagery used to depict the Divine in religious art, literature and ritual.
- Students will develop an understanding of the divergent of views on the role of
 women even within particular religious tradition, as well as and wide gap which
 separates groups on the extremes of the spectrum of the attempt at gender equality
 by Mainline American Christian Churches and the narrowly defined gender roles
 of Islamic Fundamentalists in the Middle East.

Women in Religion

- Students will develop an understanding of historic and contemporary issues of religiously motivated discrimination again women and the conflict between some religious traditions and modern views of gender roles, gender equality and human rights.
- Students will learn about the heightened role of women in the religions of indigenous peoples, the earliest religious traditions and non-Western religions.
