SOLV Beach and Riverside Cleanup

The fall SOLV Beach Cleanup involved a local waterway cleanup. Organizers have found that 60-80% of trash that ends up on the beaches of Oregon starts from the creeks and rivers that empty into the ocean.

This time we decided to help a county park in our community instead of commuting all the way to the ocean beaches. After a little deliberation, and some quick research, we decided on going to Fall Creek Park, a short 10-minute drive from Thurston. This is a little county park that has been adopted by two local women, Maggie and Pam. They have slowly been reclaiming the area from the Himalayan blackberries and Scotch

broom that have grown over the years. Five members of our chapter and two family members were able to show for this event. We cleared a pile of debris that was about ten feet in diameter and a little over

six feet high. We have been invited to return any time we would like. The chapter is discussing making this our semi-annual SOLV project. Car Smash

Another fundraising activity will be held the week of the Civil War football game between the Oregon Ducks and the Oregon State Beavers. From November 29th through December 3rd we will have a car smash to raise funds for the chapter. We have received approval from the college to bring in an old car and beat it up with sledgehammers! If all goes as planned, half of the car will be painted in Beaver orange and black and the other half in Duck green and gold. Tickets will be sold to those who want to pick up the sledgehammer and bash their opposing team. We have been assigned an area near the southwest corner of the Center Building which will give us great visibility.

What's the Value of a Book?

Every year a billion books are sent to landfills while many people only dream for a chance to read. Sigma Zeta, in cooperation with Better World Books, is saving books destined for the landfill. Better World Books was founded in 2002 by three friends from the University of Notre Dame who started selling textbooks online to earn some money, and ended up forming a pioneering social enterprise — a business with a mission to promote literacy.

As of now, Better World Books has turned 35 million donated books into \$7.5 million in funding for literacy and education. In the process,

they have also diverted more than 13,000 tons of books from landfills.


Thanks to the donations from LCC Students and staff, your Phi Theta Kappa chapter shipped 21 boxes of donated books this September contributing to:

- Total Pounds of Books Diverted: 6,283
- Total Trees Preserved: 67
- Total Gallons of Water Conserved: 49,315
- Total Pounds of Greenhouse Gases Diverted: 8,998
- Total Kilowatts of Electricity Saved: 15,238

I have heard that there are leadership roles in Phi Theta Kappa, but it appears that all the positions are already filled. Are there any other opportunities for leadership? -BR

Dear BR: There are leadership positions available at many levels within Phi Theta Kappa. At the chapter level there are five elected and numerous appointed positions. One of the elected positions is currently open, and if you or anyone else will be around during the 2011-12 academic year, the position of president elect is currently unfilled. The president elect shadows the president for the year and then assumes the position of president at the formal induction in the spring.

The appointed positions are the active team leaders, and they are in charge of the individual projects. Look through this newsletter, and you will see many different projects. Some are annual projects, such as the fall campus beautification, and others are on-going like Better World Books. There are many more projects than are mentioned in this newsletter, and the more members who are involved, the stronger and more involved our chapter becomes.

Beyond the chapter level, there are regional and international leadership positions, as well. Elections for both of those are in the spring. To run for an international office, the process begins in late fall, and it is an intense and highly rewarding



process. Running for a regional office is less rigorous, and it begins in early spring. If anyone is interested in either of these types of offices, please come see me.

During the year I often offer leadership workshops for chapter members. These workshops are designed to improve members' skills, and the topics are based on the members' needs. If you have topics that you would like to have covered, please let me know, and I will find a method of delivering that instruction.

Finally, taking that step forward to lead is a little scary, at first. As you develop your skills, you will feel more comfortable. Community college is the perfect place to develop leadership skills, and we are extremely supportive for you to do so.
