### **QUESTION 3**

Responses by Category – Question 3:

### What should Lane Community College do to respond to the changing environment?

NOTE: Following are responses to question 3 that have been organized by categories. Some responses could be included in multiple categories (e.g., responses that deal with the curriculum (category 8) and technology (category 9)), but the following list has comments reported in one category only. Also, for some categories (e.g., Curriculum {category 8}) sub-categories could be created to organize ideas around more specific themes.

# 1. Ongoing monitoring/assessment of, communication with, and reaching out to our community:

### **Overview of responses:**

To effectively respond to our changing environment, Lane should be prepared to reach out to our community, including continual monitoring and assessment of community needs.

- Buy and support local
- Communication with people to "hear" what they need
- Concise/quick response
- Continually monitor our environment global, regional, local
- Educate our public re: value/importance of higher education and public higher education
- Evaluate our work environment to be more flexible and ways of working
- Identify WHO our students are
- Increase global universal/creative response to changing world
- Listen
- Listen to public needs/ask them
- Market to potential populations of students (world-wide) ahead: A&P Su '08 for military anywhere
- Marketing the value of the College
- More information to high school students
- More marketing on what we do well!
- More outreach to high schools
- More representation in Salem
- Pay attention to what is going on
- Pressure government to balance government spending
- React quickly to change
- Recognize/adapt to changing demographics
- Research market/better marketing

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### 2. Workplace and staff (e.g., more flexible working, training for staff):

### **Overview of responses:**

Lane will need to need to invest in and support training and professional development for all employees.

- Be flexible
- Counseling cross-training for instructors/staff
- Facilitate interpersonal/interspecies connections
- Four-day work week year-round (& school week)
- Increase training for staff to keep pace with change
- Invest/support faculty/all employment groups training, professional development
- Lane employees need increased training in/access to technology
- Maximize our flexibility
- Meet students' technology expectations; staff must keep up; PD needed
- More responsible processes
- Shift in awareness needed on a national level towards importance of knowing more than just "our" English
- Six-hour work day with full benefits
- Staff at appropriate levels
- Staff training for working with change of student population
- Unionized work force across community colleges
- Universal health care

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# 3. Fiscal issues (e.g., revenue independence, tuition, revenue and expenses, scholarships):

#### **Overview of responses:**

Lane will need to assist more students financially (e.g., reduced costs to students and increased scholarships/financial aid). We should continue working to achieve a sustainable budget – including effective financial planning, pursuit of grant funding, and increased entrepreneurial activities. We should also help students improve their financial literacy.

- Address need for scholarships, provide bridges to access that are tuition free
- Affordability what do we do and do it well
- Come up with more stable/sustainable budget process
- Consider economic status of students and rent or loan technology equipment; don't exclude in your technology
- Continue being fiscally prudent with college resources/revenues
- Continue to get budget in order
- Entrepreneurial → seek revenue sources (sell services, land, etc.) look outside our community
- Entrepreneurial activities to increase revenue

### 4. Structure and infrastructure (including facilities and transportation):

### **Overview of responses:**

Lane should promote greater transportation efficiency (e.g., car pools, bus passes) and even increase coordination between scheduling of courses and buses. We should increase the number of smart classrooms and enhance our satellite campuses.

- Alternative energy/facilities

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### 5. Sustainability:

### **Overview of responses:**

Lane should be a model of sustainability.

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# 6. Courses and services for communities of color, international students and other special populations:

### **Overview of responses:**

Lane should increase services for students of color and students with special needs including international students, vets and students with mental health challenges.

- Increase attention to socialization, e.g.: women in transition, men in transition, families in transition
- Increase services to students of color, Latino/a students

- More training in how to meet needs of international students (balancing expectations)

- Somehow make it easier for full-time workers, vets, single parents, divorced people, other nontraditional, to go to school: transportation, delivery; remove obstacles
- Specific programming for veterans

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### 7. Partnerships and community connections:

### **Overview of responses:**

Lane will need to increase its collaboration with local businesses and partnerships with other educational entities.

- Better articulation with high schools
- Build alliances with businesses to provide funding in their fields
- Business/college collaboration with job placements; on-site learning
- Collaborate with community
- Collaboration with different institutions
- Community outreach; send work to the outside world (i.e., article written submitted to newspapers)

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### 8. Curriculum, pedagogy, assessment and enrollment management\scheduling:

### **Overview of responses:**

Lane will need to increase its collaboration with local businesses and partnerships with other educational entities. We will have to be flexible with offering courses (using technology, a variety of delivery modes and teaching styles, and offering more courses during the evening and on weekends). We should increase short-term, skill-based career-technical programs that have clear career pathways.

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#### 10. Services for students:

#### **Overview of responses:**

Lane should expand student support services that contribute to student retention and success, including mandatory orientation and advising, increased placement services. These services should be available in languages other than English.
